

# He Will Live On! Matthew Schmill

How we keep our child's memory alive so they are not forgotten varies in each family. For some it's an increase in the number of angels around the house. For others, the number of pictures of our child. Some plant a garden with statues and fountains. Some take action. We have done all of the above, but most of all, I chose action. The night Matt was taken from us. I made a promise at the Hospital, that he would not be forgotten. Somehow and in some way I would make the world know and remember him.

#### The Jeep

Like all of us, Matt had his Dreams. One was the love of his 1980 CJ7 Jeep. One afternoon when we were talking, I asked him when he might be selling his Jeep. His reply, "I don't ever want to sell my Jeep! I want to fix it and drive it to Colorado to ride along the Continental Divide." After his funeral his closest friends asked if they could help to fix his Jeep. Because of the number of things that were wrong with it, we had a fundraiser at the Pub that he was at that last night. Between the raffle and individual donations, we were able to raise enough money to at least get a good start. The World Herald wrote about Matt and his Jeep, and several area auto parts stores donated parts, AAMCO fixed the transmission, LineX covered the interior and someone he had worked for did the Custom paint. But the one that made the difference was a young man that stepped forward and volunteered to complete all other mechanical problems and all the bodywork. When he called to volunteer his time, he told me that after reading the article, he knew he needed to do this as if someone was calling to him. As we worked together the next 10 months, we learned that he had worked at the same body shop as Matt. He remembers talking to him about working with cars. At Christmastime last year, we received a letter he had written his senior year in High School. In it he talked about his Jeep and referred to it as "Big Beast". On August 4, 2005 Matt's Jeep made it trip to his beloved Colorado with his Mom, Dad, Sister and 6 of his closest friends. He rode along the top of the Continental Divide. We had a small ceremony and buried an airtight cylinder with a picture and notes from all who made the trip. Matt was killed as he was crossing the street by a drunk driver and "Big Beast" will be in area parades and events as a symbol to don't drink and drive.

#### Matt's Day

Matt was hit and killed by the drunk driver at 12:30 am on his 23rd birthday, as he was walking home with his friends. after celebrating his birthday. April 24 is now Matt's Day. On the first anniversary we gathered over 50 of his friends and family to have a balloon release at the gravesite. Everyone was asked bring a balloon and we supplied a small cards to write a note to Matt and then attach it to the balloon ribbon. We had a short service inside the mausoleum and than moved outside to an open

area. We counted to three and wished Matt a Happy Birthday. It was just another way to remember and again say good-by. We plan to do something similar each year.

### ... about HEART




Each of us has two hearts. The one that beats in our chest and sustains life. We know about that one. And the one that is described by philosophers as the residence of our spirit and our consciousness. Most of us probably didn't get to know that one until our loss. Remember the fists that sat in the middle of your chest for the first several months? And you went to

the doctor, he did an EKG, and said, "Your heart is just fine, no problems."

The heart that was laid open by this event can't be seen on an x-ray or measured by any EKG. And once opened. it can't be sewn up. We're stuck with it. AND BETTER OFF WITH IT! The compassion lesson is learned when you can control your tears for your own child, but can't control your tears for another's child. And through this terrible experience, we have all learned that compassion and love, both seated in heart #2, are the only important things in life.
